From providing much-needed infrastructure to clearing the way for new industry, here are just a few of the exciting happenings at the Port.

Crews are hard at work installing water and sewer lines at the Harry Wall Industrial Park, a 117-acre section of the Port. These infrastructure upgrades will not only benefit existing tenants but also accommodate Northwest Fourslide, a manufacturing company relocating from Oregon. The new facility, set to house over 40 employees, is rapidly progressing and is scheduled to commence operations this summer.

"Our continuous goal is to enhance services for our customers and community,"

said Port General Manager Scott Corbitt. "By offering robust infrastructure, we support businesses operating in the Port while paving the way for new industries in the future. This ultimately contributes to the overall economic well-being of our region."
